70% OF YOUNG VOTERS AGED 18-34 MAY ABSTAIN FROM VOTING

The lack of interest in politics and the disenchantment of young voters may explain this record. On Sunday, the first party in France could be abstention. About 57% of those called to the polls may not move, according to our Odoxa Dentsu Consulting survey for Le Figaro and France Info. Disenchantment with voting, perceived as having no impact on daily life, is one of the main reasons for abstention

Indifference is the second key to explanation, especially among young people: among potential abstentionists under 25 years of age, a narrow majority (51%) say they are "not really interested" in politics.

Emmanuel Macron reacted vividly. He is prepared to lower the voting age to 16. The president made this gesture conditional on the 18-25 year olds, who are traditional abstentionists, going to "saturate all the voting counters in the next elections."

"Five years ago, almost three-quarters of those under 25 years of age were not able to vote," said Emmanuel Macron.

EUROPE'S FAR-RIGHT LEADERS UNITE WITH A VOW TO 'CHANGE HISTORY'

Never in living memory have we shared so many common challenges, and never has the outside world tested us so forcefully; but for all the talk of a shared European public space, we have become more, not less, parochial.

Is there still time, before we shrink further into our silos of domestic grievance, to remind ourselves of the cards we do hold? Europe's democratic and welfare state model may be flawed, but to this day it delivers the lowest levels of inequality in the world (only Canada does as well). The EU as a bloc is the only vehicle through which we stand a chance of weighing in on a global, vital issue.

These European elections, the first since the refugee crisis, since Brexit and since Trump, will in many ways define what we can or can't be – the story we want to tell ourselves and the rest of the world.

TIME FOR EYES OF EUROPE?

In the 1950s and 1960s, I benefited from free, high-quality municipal public education provided by highly educated university teachers, most of whom were



highly socially committed intellectuals, neither especially from the right nor particularly from the left. Their first concern was to arouse the curiosity of their pupils and to train their critical minds and discernment.

My daughters who are forty years old have also had this privilege but not my grandchildren and I regret it. It would be totally unreasonable to turn the clock back and return today to the educational methods of the 1960s. However, it would be completely irresponsible to abandon the priority given to critical thinking and the promotion of democratic values. This must be the very first concern of the Eyes of Europe self-learning platform.

It has set itself the objective of stimulating the values that are at the heart of democracy with the aim of training young European citizens capable of resisting the sirens of souverainistic nationalism and aggressive populism.

Today, European leaders seem to be short of ideas and the EU is torn apart like never before, and for the first time in its history, it even seems threatened with collapse. The EU appears to be politically and institutionally broken down.

To be honest, it is inconceivable, even incredible, that the EU, since it has existed and a fortiori since the Internet and social networks have developed, has not been able to adopt a real communication policy. Since neither its leaders nor its institutions seem capable of promoting "Europe", it is perhaps up to each of us to do so and, by not giving in to the anxious atmosphere of the moment, to tell our children, our relatives, our friends, our neighbours what we expect from the EU and why, despite everything, we are proud to be European.
